> Ridership on Amtrak's Virginia routes reaches all-time high

[Report from Progressive Railroading] The <u>Virginia Passenger Rail Authority</u> (VPRA) and <u>Amtrak</u> announced yesterday that ridership on state-supported trains reached 110,256 passengers in July, a 28.9% increase from June's level and a 19.8% increase compared with prepandemic ridership in July 2019.




[Above] Looking east, we see the tree as it stood in Dec. 19th, 2021.
