The Thermal Belt Railway (reporting marks TBRY) is a Class III short line railroad that operates for freight service on an irregular schedule on a former CSX line from Bostic to Forest City and on a former Norfolk Southern line from Forest City to Alexander Mills, NC. Total mileage is 8.5 miles. Connections are made with CSX at Bostic. The former CSXT Bostic-Forest City line was originally built by the Central Carolina Railroad in 1886 as part of a route from Rutherfordton to Charlotte, NC.

In the News ...

CLINCHFIELD RAILROAD MOTOR CAR DONATION

Recently Watauga Valley RHS&M was donated an original Clinchfield Railroad motor car by the Alexander family. The motor car, used by the signal department, is complete; we hope to have it back home in the coming weeks. Look for further information in the next *Whistle Stop*.

SIX MEMBERS RESIGN FROM VMT BOARD

[*ROANOKE TIMES NEWS*] Six members of the Virginia Museum of Transportation Board of Directors have resigned. They submitted letters of resignation at the museum's annual meeting [June 22nd]. And their departure has fueled speculation and concern about the future of the museum and the steam excursion program.

It took a team to pull off the excursions with the 611 steam engine last fall, but Will Harris spearheaded the effort, and owns the property where passengers boarded the train. Now, he and at least two other board members who were instrumental in that operation have stepped down. In a telephone conversation Thursday morning, Harris said he was motivated by health concerns and a desire to spend more time with his grandchildren. He said he wishes the museum well and will do what he can to support the continuation of the excursion program.

Former Executive Director Bev Fitzpatrick is not a current board member and did not attend the annual meeting, but he says the news of the six resignations is a major concern. "And for something that's that important to me and to Roanoke, your first reaction is something's not right," Fitzpatrick said. "And that's not what we want from a major icon."

We [the newspaper] sat down with Board Member Tom Cox, who was speaking for the museum Thursday afternoon. He thanked the board members for all the work they have put into the museum and the recent excursions. He acknowledged some differences of opinion among board members, but said he doesn't believe there was a major rift that prompted the departures. Cox said the museum is committed to keeping the 611 in operating condition, and he said the museum is looking forward to running excursions again in the future.

Closed Canton, NC Paper Plant Sold

[WYFF-TV, Greenville, SC] Pactiv Evergreen has announced a \$110 million deal to sell its facility in Waynesville, Haywood County, NC along with a paper plant in Arkansas, according to the company's website. Global paper and pulp manufacturer Suzano S.A. has agreed to buy the facilities. The facility in Waynesville provides "incremental extrusion capacity" for the items produced in the Arkansas paper plant, the company said.

Hopefully this is good news for Blue Ridge Southern Railroad, which reportedly lost 72% of its freight traffic [Asheville Citizen Times] when the plant was closed last year.
